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In the course of the year, students from Mansonville and Eastman schools participated in a training program on the protection of wildlife and habitats as part of RVLT's environmental education program. Accompanied by Environmental Educator, Isabelle Grégoire, the children had a chance to visit a diversity of habitats in either Potton, Bolton-East or Eastman. The program concluded with an environmental expo organized by the students. The enthusiasm was palpable and the exchange

between the students of the two Mansonville schools was a delight to see. This is the kind of initiative that encourages our children to get involved in the conservation of habitats and ecosystems in their community.

New on the trails

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Because we open our land to the public we have to take <u>extracare</u> to respect the balance between human and wildlife needs. From mid-April till the end of June is baby time in the woods. Signs and barriers are posted near vulnerable areas. Please do not enter these areas during that period. We also ask that you stay on the trails so that the life outside them can flourish undisturbed!

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Repairing Our Trail Infrastructure

Our trails and bridges are starting to show wear and tear, and several need urgent attention. We will do what we can within the limits of our budget and, depending on the success of our fundraising, a number of maintenance and restoration projects are planned for the upcoming year. A top priority is creating barriers to stop motorized vehicles. One more step for the protection of natural habitats!

Since last December, an additional 6 hectares of natural habitats is protected in perpetuity thanks to a generous donation from Mr. Jon Breslaw. The property, adjacent to Lake Sopala in

the Township of Potton, includes a wetland as well as several streams and mature forest communities. A number of species at risk have also been recorded by Appalachian Corridor biologists, among which are the Two-leaved Toothwort and Ostrich Fern, both designated Vulnerable in Quebec.
