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RVLT's tribute to the International Year of Forests

The United Nations General Assembly declared 2011 "International Year of Forests". To honour this unique event, the Ruitter Valley Land Trust has produced a series of four beautiful botanical posters. The scenes from the Ruitter Valley remind us how our forests, which are home to 80% of the planet's biodiversity and store tons of carbon dioxide each year, are essential to our well-being: Forests act as the planet's lungs! In addition to providing shelter and food for wildlife, they play an essential role for the health of our ecosystems.



Our posters are available at the Potton Tourist Bureau, at Au Naturel in Sutton and Brome Lake Books in Knowlton for \$10 (big format) and \$5 (small format). Post cards are also available for \$1.

There are also a few copies left of the Eco-Guides of the Ruitter Valley. Among other things, we learn that the Jack-in-the-pulpit can live up to 200 years and change sex from one year to the other; or that food from man-made buffets may be dangerous to deer, because it's stomach is adapted for digestion and absorption of energy from small branches.

Conservation of natural areas

Did you know that a town with biodiversity-rich habitats contributes to the health and quality of life of its community? In addition, closeness to natural areas can add 15% to 20% to property values.



Such facts illustrate what an important role the biological diversity plays in our day-to-day activities! In that respect, RVLT continues to pursue its primary mission: the protection of non-fragmented forests, which are essential for wildlife. Environmental Education in local schools

Once again this year, our "Faune sans frontières for Youth" Program was a great success in the Mansonville, Eastman and Knowlton schools. Since 2002, over 400 students from 6 primary schools in the region have been initiated to learning about the conservation of natural areas. That's in addition to the many teachers and parents who have accompanied the children on their field trips and members of the community who have visited the environmental expos organized annually by the students.

Canada-US Transborder Educational Program

RVLT also innovated by implementing a Canada-US Transborder Educational Program in three primary schools in Knowlton and Jay, Vermont. The project was carried out in cooperation with Vermont's « Staying Connected », a 30-town initiative designed to safeguard key wildlife habitats for creatures big and small. As part of this joint program, a total of 80 children from Knowlton Academy, Saint-Edouard International and Jay/Westfield Elementary schools were initiated in animal tracking and wildlife corridor conservation. On the trails
